
# Community Foundations and the Philanthropy Ecosystem

# Why This Research Matters

#### **Breaking Silos**

Organisations often work in isolation, duplicating efforts and missing collaboration opportunities. Limited dialogue across sectors wastes resources.

#### **Understanding Networks**

Power dynamics, resource flows, and informal networks remain invisible, making coordination difficult and sustainable support systems hard to build.

#### **Building Ecosystems**

Comprehensive mapping is crucial for strengthening the industry, enhancing collaboration, and unlocking full potential for sustainable community development.

# Research Approach

01

#### **Survey Design**

Comprehensive online survey capturing quantitative and qualitative data from Community Foundations across both countries.

03

#### **Data Collection**

22 organisations responded (95% response rate), providing insights on ecosystem actors, relationships, and aspirations.

02

#### **Network Formation**


23 Community Foundations identified in Malawi (12) and Zimbabwe (11), forming two national networks as survey population.

04

#### **Analysis**

Face-to-face dialogues and comparative analysis revealed patterns, strengths, and gaps in the philanthropy ecosystem.

### **Community Foundations: The Landscape**



Organisations span Malawi's three regions (Northern, Central, Southern) and Zimbabwe's six provinces (Bulawayo, Manicaland, Mashonaland East, Mashonaland West, Masvingo, Matabeleland South).

# Multiple Roles, One Mission

# Implementers (86%)

Direct service delivery and program implementation addressing community needs, especially for vulnerable populations including people with disabilities.

#### Resource Mobilisers (77%)

Raising funds from diverse sources—international donors and local givers—while promoting a culture of local giving and community connection.

# Conveners (27%)

Bringing stakeholders together for dialogue and collaboration, though resource scarcity limits this critical ecosystembuilding role.



# The Ecosystem: Key Actors and Relationships

#### **Intermediary Organisations**

Provide bridging functions and capacitybuilding support, connecting grassroots organisations to resources and networks.

# International Foundations & Individual Donors

73% identify these as primary financial resources, essential for sustainability and attracting additional funding.




# Other Community Foundations

77% rate peer organisations as very important for mutual support, learning opportunities, and collective action.

#### **Nonprofit Organisations**

Critical partners working on complementary issues—education, health, water—providing specialized expertise and community connections.

# Critical Challenges Facing the Ecosystem

#### **Limited Funding (95%)**

Inconsistent funding from community contributions, small grants, and occasional partner support threatens sustainability and collaboration.

#### **Communication Gaps (36%)**

Poor connectivity, limited visibility, and inadequate information sharing hamper coordination efforts across the ecosystem.

#### **Regulatory Uncertainty**

Zimbabwe's 2025 PVO Amendment Act creates confusion around registration, cash donations, and fintech giving platforms.

# **Building a Stronger Future Together**

#### **Regular Convenings (91%)**

Create platforms for connection, relationship building, and shared learning to address isolation and fragmentation.

#### **Joint Capacity-Building (82%)**

Strengthen organisational capabilities through peer learning, mentorship, and shared programs that reduce costs.

#### **Collaborative Funding (77%)**

Pool resources for greater impact, reduce competition, and build sustainable local giving culture.

# The Path Forward: From Potential to Power

#### What We Know

- 91% report at least mildly strong relationships—a solid foundation exists
- 73% cite high community trust and engagement as the greatest strength
- 64% collaborate regularly with other actors
- Shared values: community-centred approach, collaboration, equity, sustainability

#### What's Needed

- Patient, strategic investment in connectivity and capacity
- Deeper engagement with government, academia, and private sector
- Sustainable local resource mobilisation for endowments
- Cross-border learning and strategic partnerships
